FIND SHALLOW GRAVE UNDER HOUSE WHERE WOMAN WAS MISSING

HOUSE BURNED SEVERAL YEARS AGO AND FAMILY MOVED ELSEWHERE.

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 19.—(AP).—
Possibility that a house, mysteriously burned in Alamo Heights several years ago, served as the funeral pyre for a young woman who disappeared and of whom no trace was ever found confronted officers today. They sought to unravel the enigma presented by the finding of human bones yesterday.

Immediately after the fire a young woman of the family occupying the house was reported missing, according to information given deputy sheriffs. When a perfunctory search was without result, the family moved away and were not seen about Alamo Heights again.

These facts were brought to light when B. A. Fussel, contractor found a mass of human bones in excavations being made for a church to be erected in Alamo Heights.

They were found in a shalfow grave about six inches below the surface of the ground, the contractor said.
